Coordinated all joint LAW/GOV PLATOs in Spring and Summer, 2002, which assignment has now been given to others.

1. Linguistics and the Bible (Hebrew, Aramaic, Greek, and general linguistics, with special competence in Hebrew and Aramaic grammatical analysis and description).

2. Law and the Bible (especially Christian restructuring of socio-political institutions along Biblical lines).
3. Nations and the Bible (nationhood, ethnolinguistic taxonomy, the relationship between language & race).
4. Political philosophy and political theology, especially issues of epistemology, ethics, and foundations of modern nation-states.
5. Middle East politics, my regional specialization (specialist in Biblical Hebrew, and moderately functional in reading both modern Hebrew and Arabic – both Qur'anic Arabic and modern literary Arabic), with a subject specialization in Islam, especially Islamic reformists and democrats.

Research

1. I seek to complete as a book my professional lifetime study of Biblical Law, especially in the form of an exegesis and exposition of the Decalogue, and the relationship of its teachings to society and politics as understood by Christians, Jews and Muslims, with some attention to the implications of these Biblical teachings to natural law, the law of nations, nationhood, nation-states, and political philosophy, and with some reflection on my personal pilgrimage into, through, and out of the Christian Theonomy and Reconstructionism movement.

2. As a result of a phone call from Vice President Barry Ryan of Regent University on Mon17Mar03, I was asked to be the faculty advisor and reader (and Sandra Bryant, the project manager) of several papers to be produced by Robertson School of Government students on the Middle East Peace Process (MEPP) project sponsored by an anonymous donor to Regent University. Subsequently, I presided as faculty advisor and reader over numerous research staff and research team meetings, a few with the donor being present, over the Spring, Summer and Fall of 2003, all with the goal of producing numerous issue papers, seven of which are core issues, and proposing a negotiation process that might work toward a resolution of the Middle East Arab-Israeli dispute. The first complete draft (a 303-page document) was finished and presented to the donor in February 2004. Subsequent meetings of the team dealt with the implementation workshops, as well as working on some professional revisions of the original document. The second complete draft (a 328-page document in three parts) was presented to Ambassador Edward Djerejian at the Baker Institute of Public Policy in Houston, TX (see 20July2004 under **Activities**, above). Now in the post-student phase, as a member of the donor's Virginia Advisory Group (VAG), we await the Ambassador's response to our meeting and documents. The donor has exclusive proprietary rights to all of these documents.

3. As a result of the murderous attack on the U.S. Pentagon and the World Trade Towers by militant Muslims, many speaking engagements (radio, television, churches, professional conferences, military) have been, and are being, booked, and some publications are now in progress on global Islamic politics, especially on the real differences between Muslims that are secular, modernist-reformist, traditionalist, and Islamist. On Mon29Nov2004, Dr. Barry Ryan, former Vice President for Academic Affairs, Regent University, officially approved my semester-sabbatical for Fall 2005 (formerly approved by RSG deans Charles Dunn and Charles Neimeyer) to prepare the first draft of my book on Islamic Political Theology. That sabbatical is now past and that draft is still in progress, but the seminal chapter on Qur'anic hermeneutics is finished, as well as the chapter on "Islamic Economics," which are currently being augmented in view of the Muslim and military conferences at which they are being presented. In progress is an additional chapter, which is on "Islam and the Nation-State." Also in progress is an additional chapter, which is on "Biblical and Qur'anic Law: A Hermeneutical Comparison," and was the substance of my Summer 2008 course of the same name at the Hebrew University of Jerusalem, and the University of Haifa (Israel) in June 2008, and at Hertford College, Oxford University (U.K.) in July 2008. In May 2009 in Israel the chapter concerning the comparative law (of Jews, Christians, and Muslims) on "The Law of War" was developed and taught. It will be taught again in Israel in improved form during Summer, 2010.
